

### Ten Commandments



### Sacrament of Anointing and Mass

Next Sunday March 11<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 pm we will celebrate the Anointing of the sick. This Mass celebrates our journey for wholeness and the life giving healing power of Jesus. It is important to receive this Sacrament of anointing as we seek to be healed physical, spiritually, and emotionally through the Spirit and Love of God. The anointing of the sick is a sacramental expression of Jesus' continuing care for those who live with the weaknesses of our human frailty. Remember – “Sacraments are for the living. You don't have to be at death's door to be anointed”.



### Ministry to the Homebound and Sick

Parishioners within the St. Leo's community may be sick and homebound and unable to come to the church for the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist assist with distribution of the Body of Christ to those who are homebound, in nursing home and hospitals. Our homebound are an integral part of our parish and are in communion with us even though they are not physically present at the Eucharist.

### Giving during Lent

During lent, we prepare our hearts for Easter. It is common to give something up for the duration of the time of lent. The Code of Canon Law remind us of other works and means of doing penance: prayer, acts of self-denial, almsgiving and works of personal charity. Attending Mass daily or several times a week, praying the rosary, making the way of the cross, teaching the illiterate to read, reading to the blind, helping at a soup kitchen, visiting the sick and shut-ins or giving an overworked mother a break by baby-sitting—all of these things can be more meaningful and demanding than simply abstaining or giving up something.

### Serra Vocation

### Call for Conscience Campaign

Cardinal Collins and bishops across Ontario are asking for an email address from every Catholic family in their community, with a goal of 100,000 email addresses collected in Ontario by the end of February 2018. This information will be used locally by Cardinal Collins and trusted faith partners to communicate periodically (approximately 6-8 times per year) on issues of particular importance for the Catholic community. The first campaign of 2018 is the Call for Conscience, inviting our elected Members of Provincial Parliament (MPPs) and those seeking office this June to increase funding/access to palliative care, to protect health care workers wishing to abstain from any involvement in euthanasia/assisted suicide and to protect faith-based facilities from participation in euthanasia/assisted suicide. ### Choosing a Sponsor

The individual chosen for a sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation or to support an adult in Christian initiation is to be an appropriate model of faith. Sponsors make a public witness to the community to the integrity of the person seeking admission into the Church and living a Christian life. For infants, sponsors would also make the Profession of Faith in the child's name and accept the responsibility of instructing the child in the faith. Traditionally, we identify the sponsor of a child for baptism as the godparent — godmother or godfather, but the technical term remains "sponsor." A sponsor must be a fully initiated Catholic that has received the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Communion, and Confirmation in a Catholic Church, is currently a practicing Catholic, attends the Sunday liturgy regularly and living the faith in daily life, must be 16 years or older and cannot be a parent.
